# Attack on Beersheba

## Importance of Beersheba

Beersheba was a heavily fortified town 43 kilometres from the Turkish bastion of Gaza. It anchored the right end of a defensive line that stretched from Gaza on the Mediterranean coast.

The first two frontal attacks on Gaza, in March and April 1917, failed. The British Army re-organised before trying again. The capture of Beersheba would break the Gaza—Beersheba line and enable the British, Australian and New Zealand forces to outflank Gaza.

## British attack on Beersheba

The British 20 Corps launched an attack on Beersheba at dawn on 31 October 1917.

By late afternoon the corps had made little headway toward the town and its vital wells. Lieutenant General Sir Harry Chauvel, commanding the Desert Mounted Corps, ordered the 4th Light Horse Brigade forward to attempt to secure the position.

### **Australian Light Horse charge**

Brigadier General William Grant responded by ordering light horsemen of the 4th and 12th Regiments to charge at the unwired Turkish trenches. The light horsemen did not carry swords or lances, so they held their bayonets in their hands and used them as "swords".

The momentum of the surprise attack carried them through the Turkish defences.

### **Fall of Beersheba**

The light horsemen took less than an hour to overrun the Turkish trenches and enter Beersheba.

Thirty-eight Turkish and German officers and about 700 other ranks were taken prisoner, and a supply of water was secured.

The Australians suffered 67 casualties. Two officers and 29 other ranks were killed, and 8 officers and 28 other ranks wounded.

The fall of Beersheba opened the way to outflank the Gaza—Beersheba Line. On 6 November, after severe fighting, Turkish forces began to withdraw from Gaza further into Palestine.

## Cowra breakout

By August 1944 there were 2,223 Japanese prisoners of war in Australia, including 544 merchant seamen. Of these 1,104 were housed in Camp B of No. 12 Prisoner of War Compound near Cowra, in the central west of New South Wales. They were guarded by the 22<sup>nd</sup> Garrison Battalion.

On Friday 4 August, in response to information that the Japanese were discussing a mass outbreak, notice was given that all Japanese prisoners below the rank of Lance Corporal would be transferred to the Hay Prisoner of War Camp. About 2 am on Saturday 5 August 1944 a prisoner ran shouting to the camp gates. Soon afterwards an unauthorised bugle was heard and prisoners, armed with knives and improvised clubs, rushed from their huts and began breaking through the wire fences. Sentries opened fire but several hundred prisoners escaped into open country, while others who remained set fire to the camp buildings.

On the night of the breakout three Australian soldiers were killed and another three were wounded. Privates B.G. Hardy and R. Jones, who were overwhelmed while manning a machine gun post, were posthumously awarded the George Cross. In the following nine days 334 prisoners were retaken. In all, 234 Japanese were killed and 108 wounded.

## RECIPE OF THE MONTH

# CURRIED SAUSAGES



### Curried Sausages

- 0:20 PREP • 0:30 COOK
- 13 Ingredients
- Serves 4



4.4/5

This cosy, family pleasing dish has incredible flavours of apples, raisins and coriander.

### Ingredients

- 3 tbsp vegetable oil
- 8 beef sausages
- 1 large onion, sliced
- 1 tbsp Keen's curry
- 1 tbsp plain flour
- 2 cup chicken stock

- 2 apples, cored and cut into 8 wedges
- ¼ cup raisins
- 1 cup green beans, sliced
- 2 tbsp cream
- ¼ cup chopped coriander
- 1 cup baby spinach
- salt and ground pepper
- 

## Method

1.  
Heat 2 tablespoons of oil in a large saucepan over a medium heat, add the sausages and brown all over, remove and set aside.
2.  
Add the remaining oil to the pan and cook stirring onions for 3 minutes until softened.
3.  
Stir through the Keen's curry powder and flour. Slowly pour in the stock stirring continually to ensure no lumps.
4.  
Add the apple, raisins and return the sausages to the pan and bring to the boil. Reduce heat to low and simmer for
5.  
15-20 minutes.
6.  
Stir through the beans, cream, coriander and spinach, cook for a further five minutes and season to taste with salt and pepper.
