

Sub-Branch Bus Trip 27 October to Maitland Gaol / Wineries

Bus departed Ary at 8am with the first port of call Maitland Goal.

The gaol was first opened to prisoners on 31 January 1848 and closed on 31 January 1998.


We saw where the executions took place at the front gate and it was explained that for a number of years the executions were public, crowds would gather on the main road to the bizarre watch and gruesome spectacle. We enjoyed the commentary provided by a gentleman named Terry with 27 years as a "Screw" or a Corrections Officer as we know it. During our 90 minute tour he told us many harrowing tales of what life was like – not only for the prisoners but also the prison officers (who were not armed). He ran us through the problems pertaining to various types of prisoners, Color, Religion, Nationality issues that caused acts of violence and how they were kept apart on different levels within the Jail. He also explained the problems of visitors trying to bring weapons or drugs through the Jail's check points and some of the extremes people went to try and bring banned things in. Privileged prisoners strived to work in the kitchen both for the extra pay and much better living conditions and accommodation. He took us to the 2 different visitation areas, the first being seats facing each other with no screens or barriers separating the visitors from the trusted prisoners, the second was an enclosed booth where hard core prisoners sat on one side and visitors on the other and talking through a screen while a Corrections Officer was in attendance. All of the conversations had when these visits were happening were taped and reviewed later. Ivan Milat was an inmate for 18 months but when he heard the Gaol was to be closed down and he was to be shipped to Goulburn Gaol he hatched an escape plan with another inmate. This was exposed when on one of his visits he advised the person to be outside the gaol on a particular day to pick him up. When day rolled around the swat team pounced and Milat and his accomplice were captured. Milat was transferred to Goulburn and the other prisoner committed suicide a few days later.

We departed the Gaol around 12.30pm and had a great lunch at Club Maitland City. All enjoyed the lunch prior to heading off to wine tasting at McGuigans winery, Pokolbin. We visited the McGuigans Wines Cellar Door for a Wine Tasting and a very educational presentation on the various wines and liqueurs available for purchase. Several of our members bought a few bottles to enjoy at home.


The lucky door prize on the bus on the homeward journey was won by Mike Humphries.

Member Profile: Eric Noel McDonald

Eric was born at Singleton N.S.W. on the 7th November 1923.

Eric was one of 5 children having two older brothers, Milton (named after his father) and Jack, and two sisters Clare and his younger sister Jean.

The family then moved to Narrabri N.S.W. when Eric's father got a position on the railways.

The Great Depression from 1929 -1939 had a great toll on the family and in 1930 the family moved to Hornsby N.S.W.

Eric started school at Waitara Public and his secondary schooling was at Hornsby Junior Tech. During the depression years the family survived on rabbits.

At the age of 12 in 1935 Eric left school and started work in a fruit and Vegie shop in Hornsby earning 10 shillings a week.

He changed positions and worked at The Turramurra Chemist delivering medication to people on a pushbike.

Eric left that job (and the push bike) and started working for a baker in Hornsby delivering bread in a 1936 Dodge Sedan and Eric says that's where he learnt to drive.

Eric started working for Scanlan Electric Signs in Pitt Street, Redfern making electric switches.

In January 1942 Eric enlisted into the A.I.F. and started Artillery training at North Head.

Eric was posted to Darwin and served with an Artillery unit at Fenton Air Strip, 100 klms south of Darwin where The American Air Force had Liberator Bombers.

Eric was posted back to Sydney for a while serving at Five Dock and Moore Park where he said he dodged a lot of golf balls.

In February 1944 Eric was posted to New Guinea and was stationed at Lae.

Eric was discharged from his military service in 1945 and started back at Scanlan Electric Signs travelling from Hornsby to Redfern.

Eric became a brick classer at Thornleigh brickworks and worked there for 20 years.

Eric had a son Alan and a daughter Wendy, from his first marriage.

Eric married Peggy Judd in 1958 at the Chatswood Registry Office where his mother and future mother-in-law were witnesses.

Eric and Peggy lived at 19 Milner Road, Hornsby and raised two daughters, Colleen born in 1960 and Janeene born in 1962.

Eric and Peggy have 11 grand-children of which 2 grandsons are Doctors and 9 great- grandchildren.

Eric's grandson Tim, has just completed The Kokoda Track that runs 96 kilometres through Owen Stanley Ranges in Papua New Guinea.

In 1997 Eric and Peggy moved to Woy Woy and in 2011 when Peggy became ill they moved into Kanwal Gardens Care Community.

Eric joined N.S.W.R.S.L. on the 12th February 1958 and his service number is NX106242.

Eric transferred from Hornsby R.S.L. to Toukley R.S.L and is a Life Subscriber.

Eric will celebrate his 100th birthday on the 7th of November, 2023 and will be surrounded by his family and friends.


